"Then said Jesus unto his disciples, If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me." (Matt. 16:24)

What does it really mean to be a Christian? Jesus tells us, as He told His disciples, to sit down and count the cost. If we are really serious about following Christ, we will examine our security and sincerity by the standards set forth by Jesus. We will follow Him with total consecration - and we will teach others by our lives and our testimonies.

Jesus said that if we would follow Him, we must deny ourselves. Self-denial is possibly the hardest lesson we will ever learn, the greatest test we will ever face. It is the way of the straight gate and the narrow road. It is the way of total selflessness on a daily basis. We renounce all our self-interests and independence; we renounce all personal pursuits that are contrary to the will of God. And when it comes to our relationships with other people (spouse, friends, business acquaintances, etc.), we

deny ourselves by being totally unselfish and putting the other person first, by preferring the other person's happiness over our own.

Then Jesus said, "Take up [my] cross." The cross is the common lot of God's children. Just as each Christian has his own special service to render to God's kingdom, so each has his own cross to bear. But we are to rejoice in our afflictions and trials, bearing them patiently so we will not become stumblingblocks.

"... and follow me." This is not a one-time, emotional high. It is a continuous following - not only when it is easy, convenient, or popular - regardless of the price. It is not a command to go before Him, but to follow Him. Following gives the comforting assurance this is not a new path we are treading. It also makes the statement to the world that we are not in the lead; we are not in command.

We are walking in obedience to another. He sets the pace and He chooses the way; our responsibility (and privilege) is to follow - all the way. He has not promised a safe journey, but He has promised a safe landing!

Jesus also promised, "I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee" (Heb. 13:5).

"Nay, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him that loved us" (Rom. 8:37).

With the help of Missionswerk FriedensBote in Germany, we were able to purchase a much newer diesel VW van. The van was bought in Germany for about 10,000 Euros (\$15,000 Cdn\$) and then delivered to Ukraine. So far we have been able to pay about \$12,000 of this. Praise the Lord! As you can see on the above photo, Peter has again printed a scripture passage on the front of the vehicle. He is planning to add more verses to the sides and the back. The old van also had verses printed on the front and the sides. Peter is "preaching" with his van even when he sits behind the wheel, driving through town or to the churches in the Carpathian mountain villages.

In February I was invited to officiate at the wedding of a distant relative in the mountain village Gethsemania. I was happy about the wonderful opportunity to share the Gospel

to the many non-believing people in the area.

This last winter the area experienced an unusual amount of snow. Our bus soon got stuck in the snow. I had to climb the remaining seven kilometers up the steep mountain road.

With the wedding about to begin, I prayed secretly to God: "Lord, give me the opportunity to preach your Word to the many guests."

The large auditorium in which the bride and groom sat was already filled with the most distinguished guests. The other guests sat in smaller


side rooms. Once again I prayed: "Oh Lord, you know my desire to be in the big room. However, it is all filled up."

Then God reminded me of His Word: "If somebody invites you to a wedding, go and sit down on the lowest place, so that they who invited you may come and say to you: "friend, come in!" Then you will have honour before those which sit with you at the table." (Luke 14: 8 & 10)

That's exactly what I did! After I took my seat, I prayed and the truth in God's Word was once again revealed. When I opened my eyes, the master of ceremonies, Tamada, came up to me and invited me to the best seat in the main auditorium. From here, everyone could see and hear me it was the hand of God!

After a short while, Tamada handed the microphone to me so that I could congratulate the bride and groom. The Georgian custom is for the speaker to hold a glass of wine in his hand during his congratulatory speech. I, however, held up the big Bible which I had brought as a gift for the bride and groom, and wished for them to live their new life together, according to the word of God. Then I turned to the audience: "I am truly honored to be allowed to be part of this wedding. Are you all aware of the fact that God has invited everyone here to participate in a heavenly wedding banquet that he will prepare? The only way to this great banquet is through your personal conversion"

The guests listened carefully to my lengthy speech. A few of the people huddled into a small group and began discussing this speaker. "He is no orthodox! He must be some sectarian." Nevertheless, others contradicted: "No, he is no sectarian; he is teaching from the Bible."

After the wedding many people came up to me with questions which I willingly answered. I encouraged them to read the Bible for themselves, to hear how the voice of God would touch their hearts.

As I headed back, my heart was overflowing with the joy of the Lord. The seven kilometers of snow-covered and rocky footpaths seemed to me like seven steps. I thanked God for his guidance and prayed that He would cause the hearts of the wedding congregation to repent and spread the fruit of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

The chief police officer in our part of town, colonel Dschangiri, invited me to a special meeting in the club building. I wanted to attend because I knew the Gospel would be preached there. However, I was so ashamed of my old rusty old wheel chair with warn-out tires. I was hardly able to wheel my self around, and I feared that the old wheelchair would

fall apart along the way. Nevertheless, after a lengthy debate with myself, I finally decided to make the trip to the meeting. I made it and have not once regretted it till this day. I received some good clothes, shoes and an almost new wheel chair. I was overjoyed and sincerely thankful to those who made this possible for me. (*Gia M.*)

I was born with a severe disability. My disability pension is extremely low. One day our mayor arranged that I would be brought to a club building in the inner part of the city. Representatives of the mission organization, "Mschwidobis Mauzchebeli" (Georgian representatives of "Missionswerk FriedensBote \Faith Mission") were conducting evangelization services. This was the first time someone told me that God loved me. The young people sang beautiful songs about God and His great love, grace and mercy. After the service I got a wheel chair and some clothes. I really appreciated this but, much more important for me, was that I received a new testament. I want to praise God and pray that He will heal my disability. *Madona*





My name is Nani Inaneschwieli. I always considered myself a religious woman. However, when I was introduced to the Holy Word of God for the first time from "Mschwidobis Mauzchebeli", (Georgian representatives of "Missionswerk FriedensBote \Faith Mission") it became very clear to me that I had no knowledge

of the true God. I received a walker because I have a walking disability. Thank you for your love. (*Nani I.*)
