Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever. (Psa. 23:5, 6)

You and I live in a world opposed to God. Even in Christian North America, society by and large doesn't understand Jesus Christ. In essence, they don't understand us either. We're surrounded by enemies - spiritual, demonic enemies. Satan wants us destroyed - he steals, kills, and destroys (John 10:10).

But in the midst of this wicked world, the psalmist David says that God will prepare a table before us in the presence of our enemies. He will be our protector and take care of us.

God will also anoint our heads with oil. Oil represents healing - an anointing that flows down upon us and gives joy. In James 5:14, the Bible exhorts us to pray for the sick, anointing them with oil. This oil, this anointing of God, breaks the yokes of the devil's bondage (Isa. 61). The child of God has been set free from sin and death through the anointed gospel of Jesus Christ (Gal. 5:1).

David then said that the Lord causes his cup to run over. God gives us so much that we have no room to contain it. Have you ever felt the joy of the Lord filling your heart until it overflowed? That's what the psalmist was talking about. The Bible says, "In thy presence is fulness of joy" (Psa. 16:11). We need to let our joy flow out and touch others for the Lord.

Goodness and mercy, claimed David, will follow us continuously everywhere we go, all the days of our lives. The goodness of the Lord never runs out; His mercies are new every morning (Lam. 3:23). And with the problems and difficulties we often face in this life, we need God's daily mercies!

David looked forward to that day when he would be with the Lord for eternity. We all look forward to that moment when sin will be finished, sorrow and heartache will be over, death will be swallowed up, and there will be no more enemies. We will dwell in the house of the Lord forever!

### **Evangelizing in the Villages**

The following two stories are translated and printed with permission from the Sept\Oct 2010 German Missions Nachrichten

Evangelist Alexander Dribnochod lives in the Kharkov area. He writes to us: We visit more than 250 villages in Kharkov area alone, weekly telling these people the glad Message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Others have been visiting another 300 villages in and around the surrounding area in Ukraine.

Here are some examples of our work:

### Even the police do missionary work ...

The services in the villages are almost always held in private homes. We have renovated old, empty, small dwelling houses into small churches in three different places. Your support was very important to us. In one village the orthodox priest opened up his church for us to have our services in. This is an exceptional case; as a rule the Orthodox Church would have nothing to do with our missionary activities.

In the small town of Tores a local police officer has

provided the Christians with his former office building. Only one office in the building is still officially being used by the police officer of the district.

One day this policeman gathered all alcoholics, drug addicts, homeless and criminals of his

district. He warned them once more about thefts and other criminal actions. At the end of his talk he said to them: "What would be best for you is to visit the Christians in this building and for you to change your lives. Otherwise I will take care of it that you will be put in prison for your criminal offenses."

### Better than beer

It was a warm, sunny day! The Christians of one of the newly assembled congregations had gathered in a tent. The congregation was studying the words from John 7:37:

"... If any man thirst, let him come to me, and drink."

On one very warm day, some young people came to the

tent and asked whether they could buy beer or other drinks there. They got something much better than that what they had asked for.

Through your financial help we were able to have a four to five day summer camp for these new converts. Where we taught them how we should live as a Christian.

One of the ladies said afterwards: "this was the first time I was among people that are Believers and I observed how they begin and end their day. They work together without using the usual dirty language. I make up my mind that I want to try to be just like them.

"Dear mission friends, our evangelistic work in the villages began 13 years ago and has developed fast with the help of all of us working together. Thanks for your good cooperation and financial support. However, the "the field of the Lord" is very big and still requires much more work. Unfortunately, the economic crisis has also complicated our mission work very much. However, doors are still open for the Gospel.

We thank all our mission friends for their effective prayers and for the continual support to us so we can continue by the spreading of the word of God in the Ukraine. Please pray for us.

### What Sacrifice?

### The Introduction

After the explosion of the nuclear reactor in Chernobyl (1986), bus driver, Vladimir Reschetnik had to evacuate the people from the city. The entire area was contaminated with the deadly radioactive materials. At that time he and his wife, Tatiana, were not yet Christians. Several hundred of the bus drivers who were engaged in this rescue operation as well, have already passed away, Some already died shortly after it happened.

Soon after the disaster, Vladimir also became seriously ill and moved to Moldava with his family. It was there that the couple came to the saving knowledge of faith in Jesus Christ.

After his conversion Vladimir felt the growing internal call of God to move back to the contaminated area. His state of health was not that important to him any more, because he knew there were many people dying without experiencing peace with God.

The bloody civil war in Moldavia forced the Reschetnik family to escape the country. God had protected them, from sure death, many times. They took this as clear confirmation of God's guiding hand.

### The Unselfishness of Love

In 1992 the Reschetniks came back to Dymer, a city

only 50 km away from Chernobyl. The deadly radioactive contamination was not as destructive there as it is in the fenced in area, the 30 kilometer zone. The desolate and sparsely populated area surrounding Chernobyl became a mission field for Vladimir and Tatiana.

For 18 years, Vladimir and Tatiana, with several other Christian brothers and sisters, spread the Word of God weekly in more than 30 villages of that region. They, as well as their children, suffer as a result of the radioactive contamination, just

radioactive contamination, just as many other people in the area do. Vladimir and Tatiana have given the concern about their safety over to God. For the unbelievers, this is the best witness of the genuine love of God.

#### **Two Time Bombs**

On the 9th of June, 2010 Tatiana suffered the first stroke, which paralyzed her right side. In an extremely critical state she was brought to the intensive care unit. A special clinic in Kiev later discovered a blood clot in the blood vessel near the brain which seriously impeded the blood flow to the brain. According to medical statistics this condition is a direct result of exposure to radioactive

contamination. After a time of rest Tatiana suffered her second stroke at the end of August. Once again, the unconscious Tatiana was taken to the neurological ward of the hospital. Her

situation is very difficult to treat because she is allergic to almost all medication.

Tatiana has regained some movement to her paralyzed limbs. She is also learning to talk again. Her doctor does not want her to laugh, cry or become emotionally excited. The doctors expect a minimum rehabilitation two year period.

Tatiana's illness is a bitter blow for many villagers of Chernobyl area. They really miss her visits, her smile and encouragement, the absence of her encouraging words and simply the warmth and radiance which she emitted.

For Vladimir, the evangelistic work has become much more difficult too. Tatiana was a very big help in his many responsibilities.

There is probably only one answer to the question; why did the Reschetniks not move away from the deadly zone which is a ticking time bomb for their own health? They simply know that for many unsaved people in the

area, another time bomb is ticking; one that has much more serious, longer-term consequences. In fact, it will eternity determine their eternal home. The Reschetniks and their assistants would like to save as many souls as they possibly can.
