And when he [meaning Herod] had gathered all the chief priests and scribes of the people together, he demanded of them where Christ should be born. And they said unto him, In Bethlehem of Judaea: for thus it is written by the prophet, And thou Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, art not the least among the princes of Judah: for out of thee shall come a Governor, that shall rule my people Israel. (Matt. 2:4-6)

At Christmastime, perhaps more than at any other time, we should consider the true meaning of Christmas. Most of the people living at the time of Jesus' birth were too busy to know the Scriptures were being fulfilled and too careless and indifferent to consider the things that belonged to their eternal peace.

Bethlehem was a small town with great significance. It was generally known that Christ should be born in Bethlehem. From Moldavia.....reunited after 30 years

Andrej Osselskij was one of few children to survive the two-year famine in Moldavia during the post-war period.

After the war, the atheistic Soviet power ruled in Moldavia. At school Andrej was teased because he had religious parents. At the age of 13 years, Andrej invited Jesus Christ into his heart. This made the mockery even worse. As punishment for this, his military assignment took him to the extremely cold northern Siberia.

It was there, in the Siberian city of Krasnojarsk, that Andrej met a group of older, religious people with whom he could visit once in a while. One day, while visiting the town museum, he noticed the heavy iron chains in which prisoners from the southwest parts of the country were exiled to Siberia on foot. On one of the chains Andrej recognized the carved words: "For the word of God".

Andrej heard about the gruesome tortures of these prisoners from the older Christians he met in Krasnojarsk. Their trek to Siberia had lasted three and a half years. Many died on the way! There were no possibilities for showers or personal hygiene, any medical care or treatments, and no overnight accommodations were offered to them.

Andrej was strengthened in his wish to faithfully serve God, even more. After the end of his military

service he remained in Krasnojarsk and was active in the local church. Andrej organized an active Christian youth group. For this, Andrej was sentenced to four years of imprisonment.

However, neither the extreme cold of -60°, nor illnesses could separate him from his Heavenly Father. After 18 years in Siberia, Andrej with his family eventually moved back to Moldavia.

Just at this time the Christians from the western countries were looking for new, better ways in which they could smuggle the word of God into the Soviet Union. There was a great spiritual hunger in the country.

In the nineteen-seventies, we realized God's mercy to smuggle the word of God across the Soviet border by heavy transport. Andrej organized the reloading and exchange for several hundred thousand Bibles during the night. When the other brothers asked him: "When will we return home after the Bible reloading?" He answered: "Maybe tomorrow; or maybe in 3 or 5 years ..."

God has protected this work in miraculous ways. At that time more than 80 tonnes of Bible were distributed by Andrej and his fellow-workers in the country. Some nights were so dark, the smugglers were hardly able to see each other. Now, 30 years later, these same men were reunited at the conference in Germany. God has made it possible. God still performs miracles! To him be all the honor and glory!

Mission in a European poorhouse.....

Today Andrej is active in the local church-planting work. He is on the move a lot, encouraging and instructing the small newly organized Bible-study and house church groups in the villages.

Andrej has other added responsibilities. He is dedicated to support the Moldavian missionaries and their families. Moldavia is the poorhouse of Europe. The average monthly senior's pension consists of a meager 12 euros (\$16.56 Cdn). More than one million people of the nearly 4.5 million inhabitants of Moldavia have moved away because of unemployment.

However, the missionaries living in the villages are not among those leaving the country. They feel they cannot leave the young, evangelical church groups. There is not enough work in the villages for the inhabitants. Therefore, the Christian families often experience the bitterest need. Andrej always looks for possibilities to provide basic food and support for these families.

Andrej's generosity and heartfelt pity is not only extended to his neighbors and friends. It begins right in his home! His wife has suffered with Parkinson's disease for 14 years.

Pray for Andrej Osselskij, for his wife and for the missionary service in Moldavia.

Out of Ukraine.....

Alexander and Vera Dribnochod from Kharkiv were honoured guests at our fall conferences. They have been our dear friends and co-workers for several decades.

Alexander is a multi-talented man and since his youth has been active in different services in the church. For the last six years, he led the mission work among the criminals in the local penitentiaries and institutions. Through this ministry, more than a hundred criminals have come to the faith. Some of them were even baptized right there in the

prison camp!

Since 1998, Alexander has been responsible for the mission work in a many of the villages surrounding the city of Kharkiv. He and his co-workers are faithful in this service every day of the year. Hundreds of people have come to the faith in Jesus Christ. Many Bible study groups and house churches have been started.

During the visits to hundreds of villages, Alexander Dribnochod and his co-workers proclaim the Gospel and distribute Christian reading material. Often his wife Vera will accompany him on these mission trips, blessing their audience with her beautiful singing.

There are many ingenious crooks and con-artists among the gypsies in Ukraine. They are very clever in monetary dealings and in magical illusions. However, most remain illiterate.

One evening, Igor was converted and asked us for a Bible. He had such a strong desire to read God's word on his own, he used his precious Bible as his primer to learn to read.

During our conversation we started reading the Bible passage from 1Cor. 6:10, "nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God." When Anna left, she no longer had any desire to steal the wheelbarrow.

A week later, Anna again came to listen to us at our service. The same wheelbarrow was standing by the fence, as if nobody had needed it all week. This time Anna made up her mind: "Today I'm not leaving the wheelbarrow here!" Nevertheless, God, through the Holy Spirit, would not allow her to touch the wheelbarrow! She left it right where it was.

Later Anna tearfully informed the house church that she had been tempted to steal the wheelbarrow for five months. However, over and over again, a higher power kept her from taking it. Finally she understood that it was God's power, and she accepted Christ into her heart.


