ere is a very simple question - one that perhaps may be difficult for you to answer: How do you know that the doctrine being taught by your church is correct? Considering the number of churches that dot the landscape of Canada and the United States, it is probable that many of these churches are propagating false doctrine.

No matter how sincere or religious you may be, if the preacher you're listening to is spewing forth doctrinal error, that error will lead to your spiritual destruction. You may have good intentions, wanting in your heart to do right in the eves of God, but you will, nevertheless, be guilty of wrongdoing.

It is true, though, that two preachers can build a sermon on the same Scripture and subject matter and still be at variance. This is why it is so important to inspect the teachings we hear. We would do well to follow the example of the Bereans of Paul's day, who, "searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so" (Acts 17:11).

Jesus said, "Ye shall know them by their fruits." Do the teachings of your church bring forth good fruit? Are people being saved by the blood of Jesus? Are they being filled with the Holy Spirit? Do you see lives changed, hearts mended, and sick bodies healed? That, my friend, is good fruit. Now, admittedly, every church will have some problems; but if a church is peopled by individuals who bear no Christian witness in their lives, then the fruit being produced there cannot, in all honesty, be called good. If you suspect that false doctrines are being taught at your church, do some searching. Don't wait. The fate of your soul demands immediate attention. ***

LADIES WORKDAY - EVERY OTHER MONDAY



For many stay at home ladies; mothers and Grandmothers, Mondays are just the first day of a new week of routine work at home. For the ladies that come to volunteer their time at Faith Mission on the Sewing-day Monday, it is a very special day! We are always glad to see each other and the familiar faces, but at the same time we are very happy to see new faces as well. It is an excellent opportunity to get out of the home and do mission-work, while working together with a group of friends and having a good time of sharing and fellowship! We have had as many as 19 ladies come in one day. Some come for half a day and some for a whole day. That is the handy part of coming to volunteer here, you can do it during the time it works best for you and for as long at a time as your time frame allows you to. Ladies that come to help on Monday Sewing Days, come to work on the different projects;

sewing or other projects. The different jobs they do are: Serging the denim pieces, sewing together the denim pieces and making long strips which are rolled up into big rolls; we have someone that picks up these big rolls and sews them together to make the blanket tops for us, at home, preparing the backing for the blankets; cutting it to size and pinning it together, sewing backing onto the denim blanket tops, cutting panties, sewing the panties; Serging them together and sewing on the elastic, doing Laundry; yes, I know this has nothing to do with sewing but this is one area where the ladies are always busy with because we get so much laundry. making pillows; stuffing them, sewing them up and

putting pillowcases on them; each pillow gets two pillowcases, recycling the fleece by cutting it into pieces, to piece together for blanket tops, carding fibre-fill; there is always lots of carding to be done; we card the fibre-fill and use it to make new pillows, sewing blanket duvets; so many of the thicker comforters we get need duvets, fixing broken zippers; we receive many, many jackets with broken zippers, we fix as many of them as we possibly can. We can't forget another very important thing that happens on Monday Sewing days and as well as on other work days at Faith Mission. That would be Faspa-Time. A time when we sit down in the coffee room for a much needed rest, a bit of food and coffee and have some Helena Elias on behalf of the ladies group good fellowship.

The work that is accomplished in one day would definitely surprise everyone! We have never kept track of how much gets sewn or cut in one day, but I remember the ladies telling me they sewed backing on 25 denim blankets, in one day. Just to give you a rough idea, we put 2 blankets into most of the bales that are shipped and we have shipped a total of 73,873 bales of clothing so that would work out to approximately 147,746 blankets. This does not include comforter type blankets which we do not put in bales. The comforters are usually rolled up with a pillow.

The work that these ladies do so faithfully is often overlooked and taken for granted. On behalf of the Faith Mission Board I would like to take this opportunity to extend a very special Thank-You to each one that has participated in the Monday Sewing Days. Jake Elias.... for Faith Mission

<u>TUCHAPY</u> CONTAINER #2018-01-236

Container number 2018-01-236 was loaded in Winkler on January 25th. It travelled by rail to Montreal where it was loaded onto a Container Vessel. On February 3rd it left the port of Montreal for Odessa. When it arrived in Odessa, there was a severe blizzard in southern Ukraine so it could not be delivered to Kiev as per the schedule. Delivery was delayed for more than a week but then it was delivered to Kiev for Customs inspection. It was unloaded and cleared through Customs and then loaded onto FriedensBote's truck and delivered to the village of Tuchapy in the Carpathian Mountains. The entire trip this container made took about 10 weeks. Depending on the delays at the port or at Customs, the time it is in transit can vary quite a bit. However, one thing is certain, when the container arrives at the destination, the Love of God is scattered throughout the community when the humanitarian aid is distributed.

MOLDOVA CONTAINER #2018-02-237

Moldova is the poorest country in Europe with nearly 17 percent of people living below the poverty line. With jobs both scarce and very low paying, almost one-fourth of adult Moldovans work abroad, one of the highest proportions of any country worldwide.

We are very happy that we were able to ship this container to the country of Moldova. This container was loaded in Winkler on March 22nd and should arrive in Odessa on May 5th and then go to Chisinau, Moldova soon after that.

"But when Jesus saw it, he was much displeased, and said unto them, Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not: for of such is the kingdom of God." Mark 10:14 (KJV)

Here are some short phrases shared by campers from the past. Again, confirming how important this ministry is to them. Many have encountered much suffering since their childhood. Some of them are unpredictable in their behavior. But, now they experienced something new; a life of hope and a brighter future.

It is comments like these that encourage us to support those who are involved with organizing and working in the camps.

1. I couldn't even imagine that I could find out more than in all my lifetime. I never had a clue that this Christian camp would be beyond my imagination! I can't describe my emotions. You may have guessed it right that this camps showed me a way to the eternal life. (A boy).

2. I came to a conclusion that I had to change my life. Without God we will live in the darkness. In the darkness of sin (A girl)

3. I believe that God will help me with what I've been taught. Now I know how to respect God and people. I want to know more and more every day. I want to remember this camp for the rest of my life (A girl) 4. Despair and disappointment of one of my roommates really touched me. A child, for the first time in my life, told me that she wants to die because no one loves her and doesn't want to make friends with her. After some visit with her, God has touched her heart, though it wasn't easy for her. We prayed together and she prayed and got saved. She asked God to bless her enemies, though she wished evil things to them before. Praise the Lord! (A group leader)

5. I haven't seen eyes like that before in my life – when the one who was the most undisciplined prayed with big tears on his face and asked forgiveness from all the children in the camp. God has melted his ice-cold heart (A group leader)

6. I want to dedicate all my life to Jesus. I want everybody to come to Jesus. (A girl)

From Carpathian Camps 2017.....

Dear friends! These testimonies tell so much! I'm sure that you also understand that this area of ministry is worth all the effort, time and money spent. We see how children respond to everything they heard about our Lord Jesus Christ and what He's done for them. Some guys consider themselves big heroes when they arrive at the camp. They want to show that they mean something. But, many leave the camp with tears in their eyes. They understand that they are lost sinners and they need to ask forgiveness from God.....

We had 8 camps in the villages of Iltsi, Bukovets, Dovgopole, Khodak, Rivnya, Tuchapy and two camps at Staische. All together we had 550 children. That is without the teachers/leaders who came from Kharkov, Odessa, Kiev, Chernivtsi and the local churches. We are grateful to God that we didn't have any accidents.

Unfortunately, we were refused to have camps in several villages because of the opposition of the local Orthodox priests. They were concerned because so many children hear the Living Word of God. We tell children and adults about sin, hell, salvation and everlasting life.
