Verily I say unto you, Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein. Mark 10:15

At one point in Jesus' time on earth, parents were bringing their children to Him to be touched and blessed by Him (Mark 10:13-16). The disciples shooed them away, thinking they were helping and that the children were distracting Jesus from more important things.

At this, Jesus got upset—well, more than upset. He was angry with His disciples for getting in the way of people coming to Him, even (perhaps especially) children.

The people of God are called to remove barriers so that others can come to Him, not get in the way.

In Acts 15, we read of some tension in the early Church over what it meant to be a part of the people of God and what was required.

It's easy to understand the struggle. The requests of the Jewish Christians to place restrictions and requirements on the Gentiles coming to Christ were probably not malicious. They wanted to do things right. They had a history of being God's people, and so far, nothing really made them change their minds on what that entailed.

So, they pushed for Gentiles to become Jews in order to follow Jesus. This first, then that. Men, we like our categories. Vaguery is not our friend. If we follow the instructions, we really follow the instructions.

But when it comes to bringing people to God, instructions can be a barrier, and those kinds of barriers to God can be dangerous.

Fortunately, James understood that God was doing a new thing. The words of Peter still ringing in his brain, reorganizing all the categories of what it meant to be God's people— James addressed the issue of Gentiles becoming Jewish to follow Jesus. He removed as many barriers as he could. He dismissed the unnecessary and invited the Gentiles to be one with God's people.

Greetings to all Faith Mission staff and supporters! I'm writing you on behalf of the congregation of Elim in Sangerei, Moldova. We would like to inform you of the work that has been going on here since the beginning of the year. With the money that we have received from Faith Mission/Friedensbote, last winter, more than 200 families received firewood. These were families in very difficult conditions. They had nothing with which to buy firewood. Many people cried with joy and thanked God that he takes care of them through us. Families who had no firewood or money went to live with friends or relatives so as not to freeze. Thanks to your help, a lot of people were able to endure the winter easier. People thank God and all of you who took part in this help. In connection with this help, they are more willing to come to church and also invite others to attend. We notice that more and more people get to know Jesus and accept God's plan of salvation.

This year we baptized six individuals in Elim. One young family who attended the church in Elim desired to be baptized, but they wanted us to baptize them in their village. They believed that since they have no believers in their village, their baptism service could serve as a witness there. The village is called Khechul-Vek, and at their request we performed the baptism in the center of the village. During the baptism, many unbelievers gathered to observe what was happening. Of course people reacted very differently. Some listened attentively to the word of God since they were hearing God's Word for the first time.

The young family who were baptized, willingly decided to give up their house So that they could hold services there. Some renovations are being

whole family was sitting on the staircase, taking cover from the incoming missiles. When he returned to the apartment for water, a rocket crashed through the roof right above their heads. In an instant, the lives of his wife and three daughters were taken. Just a pile of rubbish, 3 bodies and a cloud of dust.... forever separating a sweet loving family. What will he tell you about the war? There is no place for joy here...

When we think of wartime, joy is not something that is associated with that term. War is grief, it is tears, it is torment and suffering, it is explosions and destruction of housing and the loss of life. In short, it's terrible! People are in constant stress from lack of sleep, from the howling of sirens, the shooting, the sounds of flying missiles. No, there is no time for joy here. Shells are lying everywhere. A minute ago your car was a prized possession. Now it looks like a pile of scrap metal. Your only mode of transport has fallen into a pile of junk and now you have to walk home from the

store, no one talks about joy. Two and a half years of a fullscale war and of misfortune has affected everyone. No one could have imagined that the time would come when losing the keys to your apartment is not the biggest issue, because the apartment no longer exists. It burned down, it was bombed so why do we need keys? Now with grief, you can stand and watch how another cozy home burns out and collapses before our eyes, and there are a lot of questions in your head, what next? Where will you spend the night? All the savings and important documents are also gone, how do you live now? The only thing that remains is to cry with those who cry. Yes, perhaps there are rays of happy moments. When the bombs did not hit your house, when another village was taken and the front advances a couple of hundred meters forward, but even then there is its own tragedy about the loss of brothers-inarms, the loss of

you, dear and sweet friends! This is your work! this is your blessing!

This is our common joy! May the Lord be glorified!

hands do not know what you are doing, but you yourself do not know what to rejoice in and whom to invite to this joy. Here they are, standing before you, these who can say "Rejoice with me" under the roar of war, under the howl of sirens, they make a covenant with the Lord. Radiant, happy, joyful, calling their unbelieving relatives for the happiest day of their lives. Together with them, it is a joyous occasion, all of the ministers rejoice with them, the church rejoices and everyone seems to say: "Rejoice with me: I have found my lost sheep"...Invite others to your joy. Share the burden that you carry on your shoulders that you and those around you can find joy. "I rejoiced exceedingly when the brethren came and testified" 3 John 1:3. When the faithful children of God come and share your work in many ways. The burden that has to be borne when they find a way to help and support. And Jesus said unto them, I am the bread of life: he that cometh to me shall never hunger; and he that believeth on me shall never thirst. John 6:35. We are so thankful that we have been able to send so much flour to Ukraine that has made so much life-giving bread, but even more important is the message that goes along with the bread that can give eternal life.

"Give us this day our daily bread" Matt. 6:11, these are words from the Lord's prayer. In times of abundance, these words are almost unspoken but in times of famine, they are the only words you can utter. In the front-line territories the fields remain mined. In many villages, there is still no electricity. People are trying to survive somehow.

We are delivering bread that was just taken out of the oven the same morning. In the car I can smell the toasted crusts of the loaves. After driving for a couple of hours, you are tempted to eat this fresh bread and enjoy it but we still have to pass a difficult offroad section before we reach the front-line zone. This area is filled with damaged houses, roofs hastily covered with plastic, a lot of military equipment, both destroyed as well as active, boarded-up windows in houses, community buildings demolished, abandoned areas overgrown with grass above fences. On the street, there are no children running and playing, no adults socializing or going to work. We see bombed out shops, village offices and various other institutions... Where can a person get food here?, especially freshly baked bread? On the outskirts of the town we see a small gathering of villagers who have stuck around. Tired, exhausted, without smiles and laughter they peer at our vehicles and into our faces. I take a couple of loaves from the back of the van and hand it to the first person, he immediately feels how soft and fresh it is. He lets out a scream when he notices it is still warm. I suggest that we thank the Lord for the bread and everyone unanimously agrees. We give bread, we give food packages. A lot of people have gathered. I'm worried that the drones will be able to determine our

whereabouts as we came in three cars. No sooner did the first three dozen people have time to receive the food parcels when the explosions erupted on the outskirts of the village. Very loud! Very powerful! We all shudder, but the locals are already used to it...

I pray in my heart, Lord protect us that no one will suffer. All one hundred and three people that have gathered receive an aid package and bread. As soon as we have finished with the distribution we leave quickly. As we depart the shelling continues causing our vehicles to shudder. Dodging potholes on the roads, we hurry to leave this area. The central part of the village has already been hit. Only a few moments separated us from explosions. There is a burning centuryold tree. Here is a destroyed multi-story building the corner apartment is broken and exposed, hanging on the wall you can see a microwave. In an instant, the life of the owners was turned into ruins. Broken furniture visible through the gaping hole across the entire width of the room. Firefighters are still extinguishing the burning objects, the smoking part of the rocket sticking out of the ground, this small instrument that brought so much grief and suffering. A little further down the street we see the store in ruins. There are almost none of them here, and this only one was open only a couple of minutes ago, and now there are ruins. One man died, seven wounded. We break through all this. Shelling continues... It is impossible to take a photo...We are already on the highway, farther and farther from the epicenter of events. Before we depart from the village, those who invited us here asked: "Give us the bread that you did not have time to distribute." The shop is broken, which means that it has become even more difficult for people now... We'll take them more when everything settles down but for now we load them up with as much as they can possibly carry. People there are left alone



with their misfortune and need. They say sincere words of gratitude. Tears in the eyes and everyone has the same question: When will the war end? I leave them a request to pray thus: "Give us this day our daily bread" and God will not leave you. Dear friends, this is all of your work, this is your donations, this is your love. "I was hungry, and you fed me," this Word is being fulfilled here in this country. Thank you for your service and support. We are happy to be useful to these people together with all of you.

Farms are broken. Expensive equipment has turned into targets. It is almost impossible to deliver farm products and businessmen do not see the point in opening shops and the like.



In this Newsletter we want to look at the history of containers getting shipped to Ukraine. As a person that is intrigued with numbers it is interesting to me that we have shipped 303 containers in 30 years and a few months. What makes this even more interesting is that although our numbers seem to fluctuate a lot from year to year our average has been 100 the first ten years, 100 the next ten years and 100 in the last ten. Our peak year was 2005 that saw 15 containers shipped and the least was 6 in 2016 (even the 15/05 and 6/16 numbers make me smile). There was a stretch from 2011 to 2021 that we stayed in single digits, from 6 to 9 per year. But then in 2022 we got back into double-digits with 10 and then in 2023 Faith Mission spent \$190,113 to ship 13 containers of clothing/aid from Canada to Ukraine, this accounted for about 1/3 of all our expenses that year. On Sep 19 we shipped the 13th container for 2024 (for a total of \$210,822 in costs to date) and it looks like we will be sending at least another 6 (approximately \$100,000 will be needed yet) before the end of the year. In addition to the increased costs for shipping we also have other projects that we are planning to fund this year yet and as of this writing our funds are the lowest that they have been for the past 6+ years. On the supply of clothing side one would think that with the increase in containers sent this year we should be running short on clothes to bale, but we have more clothes in our warehouse now than we did a year ago that needs to be sorted and baled. Last year this time we had an overflow of 12 totes upstairs, and now we have 35 totes worth upstairs. So our current need is twofold; 1. we are in need of funds, 2. we are in need of volunteers, but the more volunteers we get the more funds we need to ship the bales to Ukraine. Looking throughout our history both of these are not new needs. We have had many, many different times over the years where we were in great need of either money or workers and the Lord has always supplied for our needs and we fully trust that He will again see us through. But...it is not "we" that "need" the funds or the volunteers or the clothes, we are doing the Lord's work and we are His workers, and we rely on Him to provide the means to accomplish what needs to be done.

This summer, more than 200 children attended our summer camp. The children were very happy in the camp. They learned many new songs and poems, and got to know each other better. There was also repentance among the children, overall the children were very satisfied.

There is a lot of work to be done weekly in two villages, in Kubolta and in Koshkodan. We are grateful to God that two families from Germany have returned to us in Elim, Victor and Margita Kosovan and Grigory and Aušra Kosovan. Both families are actively involved in the ministry and help us to conduct evangelism.

On Sunday, September 22nd, we will celebrate the Harvest Festival (thanksgiving for the harvest) at Elim. After lunch on the same day we will celebrate the Harvest Festival in the village of Kubolta. We have distributed invitations to the entire Village so that more people can come listen to the word of God. Next Sunday, September 29, in the afternoon, we will celebrate this festival in the village of Koshkoden. Please pray for our work, so that more people will come to Jesus. Also, pray for these two young families who have returned from Germany and are taking part in working with children.

This year there was a great drought in Moldova Our harvest was very poor. Wheat yields were about 40% less, sunflowers yielded 70% less and corn 80% less. Because of this, food prices are constantly going up. Those who were already poor, are getting even poorer. We ask you in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, as you are able, please help these poor families with food and firewood.

We are very grateful to you for our constant support, for all the attention that you give us, We will pray for you, that God will bless all those who work in the Faith Mission/Friedensbote mission, that God will grant you His abundant blessing, health, wisdom, happiness and

strength in your work, and we wish that our work continues to serve God in this field.
